

apprentices

AGES 10-14

We held two separate programs for five youth each. Each group had farm responsibilities such as weeding, harvesting, and feeding the chickens. Each apprentice earned a daily stipend for their work, with total earnings of \$420.

interns

AGES 14-16

We held one internship program with four season-long interns. We had one intern who was unable to finish the season because of an elderly family member. Each intern earned a daily stipend for their work, with total earnings of \$3,340.

wayfinders

AGES 14-18

Through a seasonal partnership, we hosted five additional teens who learned how to work on our farm. They helped with weed management and miscellaneous tasks during June and July. Wayfinder, a start-up non profit paid them using private funding.

entrepreneurs

AGES 14-16

After the conclusion of the summer season, all interns were invited to an extended program to learn how to make, market, and sell salsa. All interns attended and split the profit of \$250 from their sold out creation.

summer camp

AGES 5-10

Although we had to limit the number of attendees to 13, we were able to hold one week of summer camp from 9:00-3:00 daily. Our interns helped lead camp, gaining additional skills for their resumes. Camp featured outdoor themes, crafts, hiking, chickens, and more.

csa members

This season, we grew food for 21 families (3 board members gifted half-share). We partnered with The Vegetable Connection to provide subsidized shares to five families.

farm build

This year brought Sproutin' Up to our new, forever farm home. In the spring, this new home was an empty lot covered in native grass. April and May were spent building out each garden bed, placing our raised beds, securing our compost, and planting all the perennial plants that we wintered in mulch piles. We were fortunate to get donations of equipment from Sunstate Equipment and manure from a local resident.

Although our volunteer shifts were cut short due to the pandemic, we were still gifted ___ hours from our volunteers. Through a partnership with Colorado State University and Northern Colorado Young Men's Service League, we continue to build opportunities for service.

chickens & chicks


